Speech Night

Address given by Mrs. A. Swart, Headmistress

A year when we look forward, seems a very long time, but I never cease to be amazed at how short a period it is when I look back. It seems only yesterday that we gathered together to say farewell to 1969 and now 1970 has only one month left. Let us look briefly back on 1970.

It was with deep regret that we learnt of the death of Mr. Todd, who had been with us for only two terms. He was a man who all his life had given to others rather than consider himself. I personally felt the loss as I had benefited from the many chats we had on education. Our sympathy and thoughts go out to his wife and family.

I was pleased with our Public Examination results, for although on the surface they do not appear good, I would remind you that 100 per cent. of our girls write "O" Level at the end of their fourth year and when one considers that we have not practised the common policy of a highly selective entry, these results are very creditable indeed. Our bright youngsters have obtained excellent results and I congratulate them. Regarding examinations, one needs a sense of balance and a well developed sense of humour to survive.

Unfortunately, because of the structure of our soil, the extreme dryness over the past few years has resulted in Cecil House cracking rather badly. I closed it therefore at the end of last term and so we lost an art room and a geography room. The Board therefore had a temporary building erected and this is now being used for Art. When one thinks of Prefabs one immediately thinks of the October heat, but because of the site chosen, it is in fact the coolest classroom in the school. We have progressed considerably over the past four years, but to lose the old hostel and chapel last year and Cecil House this year, is hard by any standards. At a guess, I should say that their accommodation replacement value must be somewhere in the region of two hundred thousand dollars.

There is, however, always humour to be found in adversity. I decided to increase the extent of the grassed terrace and this meant filling in a wide footpath which in places was four feet below the level of the terrace through which it passed. Now we may have difficulty in growing grass, but I can assure you there is one thing that grows abundantly here and that is rock — it shoots up unexpectedly all over the place. So for days in April we moved barrow after barrow of rock to fill in the footpath. Soil was then placed on top and grass planted. This we watered in abundance — we talked to the grass and through loving care it flourished. In August our prefab had to be erected and there was only one really suitable position for it — yes, that's right — where the footpath had been and so we now spent many hours digging out the rock and moving barrow after barrow after barrow of rock. No wonder the Africans at times think us strange.

On the games side — I have been very pleased to see that what we lack in numbers we make up for in spirit and determination. Our senior swimming team came third out of the ten schools from Matabeleland and the Midlands, qualifying therefore for the Rhodesian

Schools' Final Gala. Our junior swimming team excelled itself by winning the Matabeleland Group 2 Gala. They then came third in the overall Gala, and one must remember that being a girl's school we gained no points in boys' events. My congratulations to them all. In life-saving two girls obtained Instructors Certificates, five obtained the Bronze Cross Award and eight Bronze Medallions. This pleases me very much. In the other games, we were not as successful, but tried equally as hard.

Our Sixth Formers started a club and we had some very interesting talks by people from various walks of life. These unfortunately ceased when examinations began to loom ahead. We intend running a number of societies covering a wide field next year. My hopes are that for example those girls who do not take Art as a public examination subject will participate for sheer pleasure.

We had another romp this year with Gilbert and Sullivan's *Patience*. As usual we bent it a little, but as the main purpose was enjoyment, I am sure Gilbert will forgive us. Our very sincere thanks to Mr. Cordingly, who in an incredibly short time trained the cast and transposed the music as he played in order to suit the girls' voices. We were indeed fortunate to have the services of a man of his calibre.

Once again this year we celebrated our School birthday with a service at St. John's and were delighted to see so many parents and friends of the school present. We are very privileged in that a few of our girls now serve at St. John's, an honour previously granted only to men and boys. Our sincere thanks to Mr. Walden, who trains them, and to the Dean and staff of the Cathedral for all their help to us. These men are extremely busy and yet they never fail to take our weekly communion service on Wednesdays and most of our services in the school on alternate Sundays.

All our girls who applied to the Rhodesian Government for training grants to study either at University or at the Bulawayo Teachers' Training College and who were over 17½ years of age were successful in their applications. I congratulate all these girls and hope that they will acquit themselves well and be a credit to the profession.

My congratulations to Sally Jackson on receiving the Milton High School Upper VI prizes for Pure Mathematics and for Applied Mathematics. I feel we here must have taught her some mathematics.

I was delighted to hear that Margaret Malan, who left us in December, 1967, and proceeded to Cape Town, has been awarded a Scholarship from the University of Cape Town to study Art overseas, for one year. The Scholarship is for R1 000. Our congratulations to her.

My thanks go out to all who have helped us, but in particular to the Heads and staffs of Milton and Townsend High Schools, where some of our girls study Sixth Form subjects. To the Education Department, and in particular the Examinations Branch, whose officials

never tire of answering my questions and who are so tolerant in solving my problems. I personally am deeply grateful to them. To the Red Cross for transporting and training our youngsters. To our Board of Governors who give up many precious hours in the interests of the school. To the parents and the Parents' Association who have worked hard and raised sufficient money to erect a sports pavilion. To the Old Girls' Association, who every month bake and sell cakes to raise money for certain school amenities.

We owe a great deal to our staff who teach because they love teaching — who give all they can because they enjoy being part of the building programme.

We say farewell to five members of staff: Miss Knight — French, Miss Dacomb — Music have been part-time staff. Miss Martin, our Secretary, who is marrying a local farmer. Miss Shields, who taught Std. I and is one of very few gentlewomen it has ever been my pleasure to know, and Mrs. Roger, who has dealt with a thousand and one things, including the laundry. It may interest you to know that in 2½ years, not even one sock has been lost at the laundry and only two garments spoiled and these were both man-made fibres which don't care for a warm iron. I thank all these folk for their services and wish them every happiness.

To those who are leaving. We are sad to see you go for many of you, unfortunately not all, have worked hard to better yourselves and to help us whenever possible. You have given of yourselves and therefore we have benefited and you have matured into responsible

young people, determined to make the most of the abilities you have.

Because we care, we have chastised you often, but I am pleased to say that you have taken it in the right spirit — not subservient — but as thinking people, who want to be valuable members of a community.

What advice can I give you that I have not already given a thousand times?

Wherever you go for further training — use your common sense, look for the good points and recognise the value of every lecturer or tutor. Always be appreciative of what is done for you. If you have difficulty, look for fault in yourself first — never condemn, for no man is wholly good or wholly bad. The world is already too full of selfish, destructive critics.

Remember that, strange as it may seem, the most important task ahead of most of you is the building of happy, balanced homes, where children laugh and are secure in the love and care and guidance you give them. Allow them to develop as individuals — never hoping to bask in their reflected glory, but always happy in their successes, understanding in their failures and indifferent to their grumbles.

You, as women, are the real builders of this world. To you falls the responsibility of the invaluable intangibles. Your achievements will go unsung, your tribulations unheard, your efforts unrecognised, but your rewards will be the greatest, for you will have what all humans seek — joy and contentment. A very happy Christmas to you all.

The Board of Governors, 1970

At the beginning of the year we were pleased to welcome Mr. Peter Robinson, who was elected a Governor in the place of Mr. Douglas Old, and Dr. Peter Evans as Chairman of the Parents' Association, both of whom have devoted a great deal of time and energy to the Board's affairs during 1970.

A slight increase in boarding fees which took effect from the beginning of the third term has enabled us to balance our budget for the year and absorb the costs of a complete repainting of the exterior of the Hostel and Administration building as well as the erection of a "temporary" Art room to replace the facilities of Cecil House which has unfortunately come to the end of its days. The Art room building exercise, which took place over the August holidays, was most competently arranged by Mr. Cheetham and Mrs. Todd at extremely short notice, and we are most grateful to them. It is, of course, a setback that the money we had to spend on it was that which we had earmarked for the improvement of the Gymnasium and the re-equipping of the Junior School. We did manage to do something about the Gymnasium floor, but the remainder of these projects will have to go forward into 1971.

We have been able at long last to give some concrete recognition to the staff who have served the school so loyally over the years, and from the beginning of 1971 St. Peter's will be paying Government rates to its teachers.

In order to relieve the Headmistress of some of the burden of administrative work which she has uncomplainingly shouldered ever since 1967, the Board has

appointed Major P. F. Bromfield as Bursar to the school, and he took up his appointment towards the end of the year.

Perhaps the most concrete achievement of 1970, and the one which may in the long run be of most benefit to the school, was the result of our negotiations with the Community of the Resurrection in Grahamstown for the purchase by the school of "Heyman House" and its grounds, which up to now have simply been rented from the Community. Due to the generosity of the Community and their continued interest in the school, we have been able to buy this property at a price which is more than reasonable and on terms to suit our lean purse. We now have room for the expansion that we are going to achieve in the future.

In our report in last year's magazine we listed our needs as a Hall, a Chapel, more classrooms, more hostel accommodation, better staff accommodation, more space, and newer and better equipment. 1970 has got us more space — and we will try to see to it that 1971 gets us at least one of the others.

We thank the Headmistress and all the staff for all that they have done and continue to do for St. Peter's. We thank the Parents' Association, whose efforts have resulted in our very own mini sports pavilion now in the course of building and ready for use in 1971. We thank all individual parents for their support, and we pledge our unstinting efforts to the continued improvement and progress of the school.

Finally, the Committee would like to thank all who helped in our 1970 fund raising projects and to wish parents, scholars and staff a happy and healthy 1971.

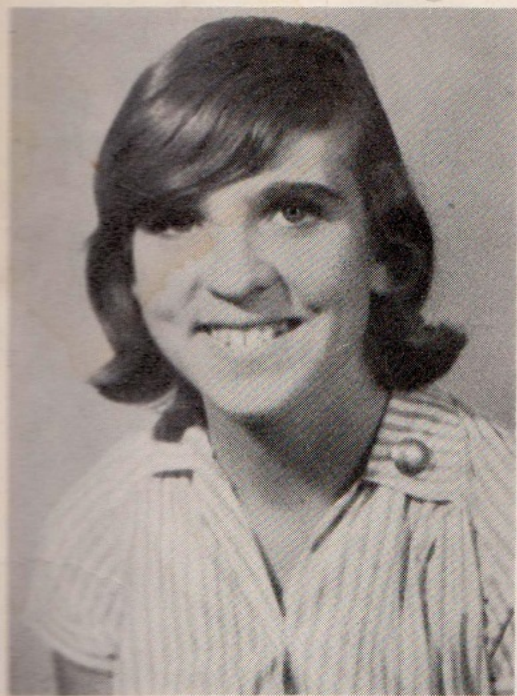

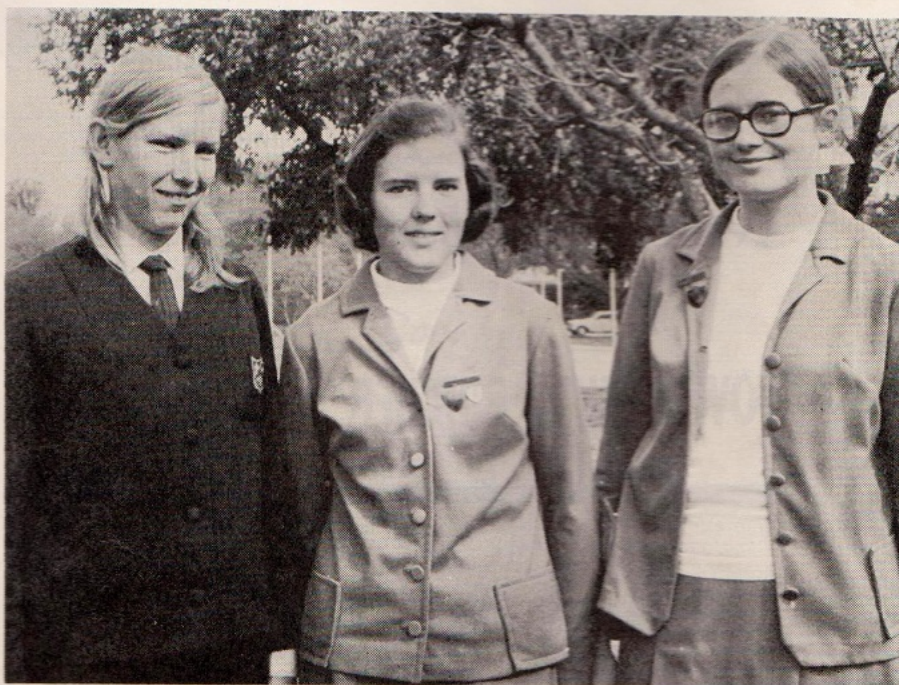

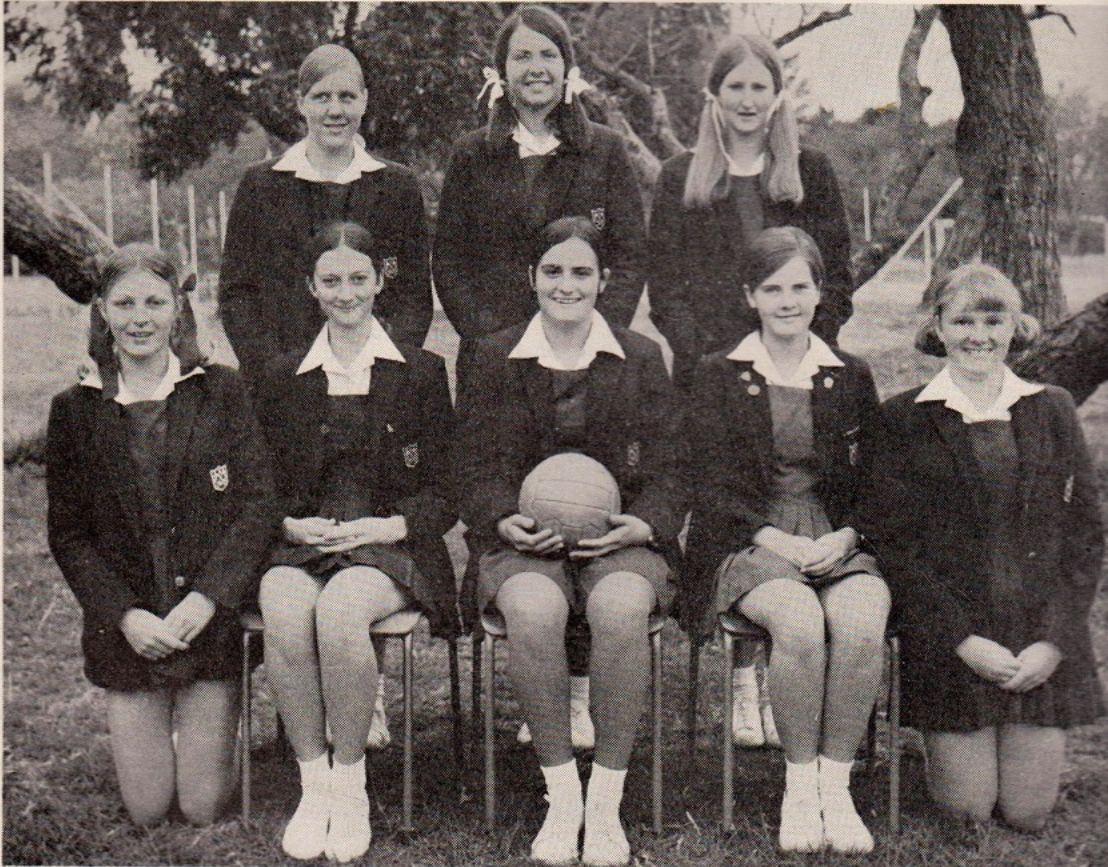
The fight was long and hard, and the sun beat down

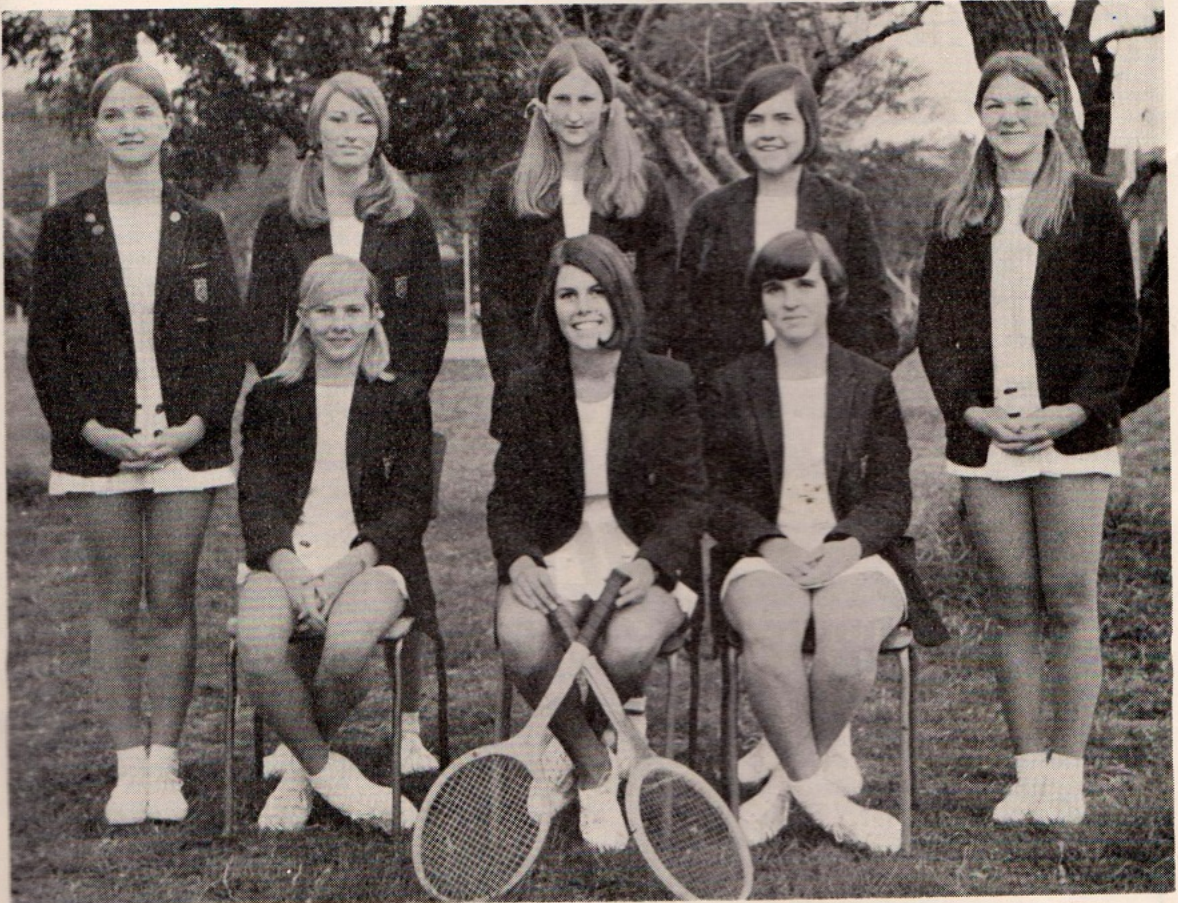
